In short, we have begun the New Year at FPC in faithfulness and hope. No doubt we will be drawing on that and more as the year progresses.

AMERICA FIRST

America First, not only in things material,

But bending in helpfulness over a sick and wounded world like a Good Samaritan.

Not in treading again the old, worn, bloody pathway which ends inevitably in
chaos and disaster,
But blazing a new trail along which, please God, other nations will follow into the
New Jerusalem where wars shall be no more.

Some day, some nation must take that path – unless we are to lapse into utter
barbarism – and that honor I covet for my beloved America.
And so in that spirit and with these hopes, I say with all my heart and soul,
“America First!”

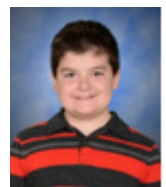

WHS Student Qualifies for 2017 Prudential U.S. Figure Skating Championships

Matthew Nielsen, eighth-grade student at Wooster High School, recently qualified for the 2017 Prudential U.S. Figure Skating Championships. Nielsen is one of 12 young men in the U.S. who will be competing at the Intermediate Men's level for the national title.

Nielsen is 13-years-old and is a member of the National Junior Honor Society at Wooster High School.

"Competing in the national championships has been a goal of Matthew's for many years," said Christine Nielsen, Matthew's mother. "He has been figure skating for almost eight years and he loves it. It is so impressive to see his skill and dedication. We are very proud of him!"

Nielsen practices five days a week on the ice at the Strongsville Skating Club, as well as three days a week at HealthPoint in Wooster for off-ice strength training. He competes eight times a year in various events.

Nielsen qualified for the national championships after winning the Intermediate Men's Event at the 2017 U.S. Figure Skating Eastern Great Lakes (EGL) Regional Championship held in East Lansing, Michigan. As the EGL Regional Champion, Nielsen advanced to the 2017 U.S. Figure Skating Midwestern Sectional Competition in Colorado Springs, Colorado, where he won the Bronze Medal in his event. Only the top four medalists at the sectional competition qualify to move on to compete at the national championships.

In figure skating, skaters compete on five different levels. Fifth-level skaters can qualify for the Olympics and be chosen for Team USA. Nielsen is currently competing at the second level. His goal is to continue to qualify for the national competition at each level and eventually be selected to join Team USA.

The 2017 Prudential U.S. Figure Skating Championships will take place January 14-22, 2017, in Kansas City, Missouri. Championship level events will be broadcast live on NBC, January 21-22, 2017.

GOOD BOOK CLUB

At our regular Good Book Club meeting on Monday evening, January 9th, six members chose their favorite fiction book and favorite non-fiction book read during 2016 and explained why. We read three non-fiction books: "Last Bus to Wisdom", "A Tale of Two Cities", and "All the Light You Cannot See". "Last Bus to Wisdom" was the favorite because of its humor, characters, and story line. However, we enjoyed the other two books as well.

The non-fiction books were "Leaving Church", "Dead Mountain", "A Civil Action", and "Re-Claiming the Bible for a Non-Religious World". The net result was a tie between "Leaving Church" and "Re-Claiming the Bible for a Non-Religious World". The former is the true story of a woman who achieves her goal of becoming an Episcopal minister, but after serving a church very successfully decides to leave the ministry. "Re-Claiming the Bible for a Non-Religious World" is a critical analysis of how the Old Testament and the New Testament were assembled. We spent considerable time talking about those two books.

FAITH AND PRACTICE

First Presbyterian Church has been supporting Wee Care for over 50 years and People to People for almost 40 years. Both organizations were founded with the help of our church, church finances and church members. Many of our members volunteer at both organizations weekly. If you are looking for a rewarding volunteer activity, please reach out to one of them. Wee Care volunteer Linda Bush can help guide you with Wee Car. People to People volunteer Carla Hall can help guide you with People to People.

Wee Care started in 1964 as a mission of First Presbyterian Church. Wee Care still stands for quality child care. Currently, Faith and Practice's contributions include \$4,500 in cash a year and collecting supplies--cleaning supplies for example.

People to People started in 1978 and is an Emergency Needs Ministry. Last year, People to People served over 10,000 Wayne County applicants. Our own Jean Philippi was a long standing Director of the organization. Currently, Faith and Practice's contributions include \$4,500 in cash a year and collecting supplies--food for example. The food that is collected is placed in the boat. We also host an annual Back to School Drive in July and Christmas Toy Drive in November. Both of these activities are coordinated by Sarah Dunlap.

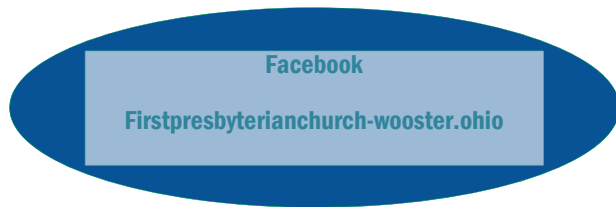
