Dear Friends,

As we enter the cold heart of winter, we can rejoice that new boilers have restored heat in our building, and corporate worship, ministry, and fellowship opportunities are restoring the warmth of our relationships together. The following pages reveal that warmth in myriad ways.

February brings us to the end of the season of Epiphany in the form of our Ash Wednesday service of imposition of ashes and shared communion with our sister congregation of Westminster. The following five weeks of Lent, highlighted by our Wednesday Night Soup Suppers, will lead us to Palm Sunday and Holy Week. This month's service of Eventide, a contemplative gathering for prayer and song and reflection at 6:30 in the Chapel, will take place this coming Sunday, February 5.

Before we enter the season of Lent and the beginning of our soup suppers, the Wednesday Fellowship Meals at 11:30 in Bruch Hall will continue to offer midweek fellowship. "The Mid," a pre-COVID evening of fellowship, will be making its return. And a new addition to our contemplative spirituality will be found in the church library, where a place for prayer and meditation is being created.

This month provides ample opportunity for benevolent giving and support of a variety of missions: the Youth Italian Dinner fundraiser; Souper Bowl of Caring, the proceeds of which will be collected by our youth and given to the FPC Meals for All; ongoing collections for Emma LoGiudice and her nursing colleagues, who will be going to the Dominican Republic on a medical outreach mission; a Call to Action evening to address homelessness in Wayne County; and an invitation to serve as a mentor with O'Huddle.

Last but not least, the Resource Development Ministry Team is encouraging those of us who have not yet made a financial pledge to the FPC 2023 Budget to do so in support all our church does for the nurture of our congregation and to meet the many needs of our neighbors near and far.

Stay warm and well this month and celebrate the gradual lengthening of sunlit days!

Lent and Holy Week - 2023

- Lent begins on Ash Wednesday, February 22, at First Pres with a combined service with Westminster at 7:00pm.
- Lenten Soup Suppers return every Wednesday during Lent from 6:00-7:00PM in Bruch Hall with a soup, bread, and fruit meal followed by a short worship service. Meals will be prepared and served by the church Leadership Teams.
- **Soup Supper Schedule**: March 1, March 8, March 15, March 22, March 29. The final soup supper will be on Maundy Thursday, April 6 (6:00-7:00pm) with the Maundy Thursday service to follow the supper.
- Holy Week begins on Palm Sunday, April 2 through Easter on April 9th. There will be one service at 10:15 on Palm Sunday and Easter Sunday.
- The Good Friday service will be at 6:00pm in the Chapel.
- Communion will be served at the Ash Wednesday service and will not be served again until the Maundy Thursday service.

<u>Ohio Northern Nursing Without Borders</u> is a student humanitarian organization that travels to the Dominican Republic every May on a medical outreach trip. Participants include nursing, pharmacy, and other allied health students and faculty.

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My name is Emma LoGiudice and I am currently in my junior year at Ohio Northern and I will be traveling with *Nursing Without Borders* as a nursing student. 



She married her late husband Lynn Zimmerman in 1962. Ginny spent her professional career in education and worked in several school districts. She taught kindergarten for many years at Melrose Elementary in Wooster. Ginny is survived by her sons Matt, Mitch, and Monti, their spouses, and five grandchildren. A service was held January 14 at FPC.



Housing and Homelessness in Wayne County

A Call to Action will be held Thursday, Feb. 9 at 7 p.m. in First Presbyterian Church's Bruch Hall, 621 College Ave., Wooster

The meeting is a follow-up to last year's community meeting on housing and homelessness in Wayne County. This year's meeting, which is free and open to everyone, will be more interactive and will focus on being a call to action. There will be two sessions that will offer opportunities for attendees to ask questions of the presenters.

"We would like people to leave the meeting better informed but also knowing how they can be active on behalf of more housing opportunities and help for the unsheltered people in our area," said Susan Figge, a member of the Wooster Homelessness Task Force and part of the community meeting planning committee. "We will be asking for community support for projects in progress and offering a number of volunteer opportunities as well as information on public policy advocacy."

The meeting is being called to remind the community of the ongoing needs for shelter, to highlight progress that has been made and gather support for new initiatives, to allow community members an opportunity to ask questions, and to offer ways individuals can help.

Finding oneself without shelter is something that can happen to anyone. According to www.knowhomelessness.com, 80% of people experiencing homelessness are temporarily homeless due to sudden changes in their lives, 50% of women and children who are without homes are fleeing domestic violence, and 45% of adults experiencing homelessness have worked in the past 30 days.

Originally an initiative of the Wooster Homelessness Task Force, the upcoming meeting has gained momentum and support from numerous area agencies and organizations. Support is being provided by the League of Women Voters, the Wayne County Housing Coalition and the Wayne/ Holmes County Reentry Coalition.

It is hoped the meeting will not only help with understanding the complexities of meeting housing needs, but also will shed light on what it's like to live through the experience of living without a home.

Invitations to the event have been sent to local houses of worship, service clubs, public school administrations, Main Street Wooster, chambers of commerce in the county, Wayne County city administrators, city councils, the Wayne County commissioners, city planning and zoning boards, city police departments, and elected representatives in state government.

The meeting will begin with two presentations. Erica Mulryan, continuum of care director at the Coalition on Housing and Homelessness in Ohio, will present a profile of housing needs and homelessness in Wooster and Wayne County, along with examples of successful efforts in similar communities. Cindy Biggs from the League of Women Voters will serve as moderator.

James Fox, president and CEO of Wayne/Medina Community Action and director of the Wayne County Housing Coalition, will profile the coalition's current initiatives and its short- and long-term goals.

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After the presentations there will be two discussion sessions. Krista Kidney, housing director at OneEighty, and Rodney Mitchell, deputy director of the Wayne Metropolitan Housing Authority, will speak briefly about current initiatives in Wooster, then take questions and lead a discussion.

The second session will be led by Rev. Dr. Kevan Franklin in discussion with community residents who are currently experiencing homelessness or have recently found housing after being without shelter. Audience questions will be welcome.

The sessions will be repeated so everyone who wishes can attend both.

During the discussion sessions, the staff of the Wayne/Holmes Reentry Coalition will be available in a separate room to answer questions and speak informally with anyone needing information or assistance for returning citizens. Michelle Kelly, director of reentry services; Matt Hankins, reentry services coordinator; and other staff members will be available.

Tables with information on volunteer and advocacy opportunities will be open for browsing between sessions and after the meeting. Volunteers will be on hand to answer questions.

The meeting will be recorded by MCTV and posted on YouTube. Last year's meeting also is available for viewing.

Wooster Homelessness Task Force can be found on Facebook and Instagram. The Coalition on Housing and Homelessness in Ohio's website includes information on how to advocate at the state level, and it offers a newsletter.

There is a snow date scheduled for Thursday, Feb. 23 at 7 p.m. at the same location. The event will be postponed if there are weather advisories discouraging travel. Postponement would be announced on Facebook via pages of the Wooster Homelessness Task Force and the sponsoring agencies.
