This highlight for Tower Tidings is written to update the congregation on the work of the Session in April/May 2024.

During the Session meeting on May 29, 2024, Jim Webster and Carol Gates were thanked for their leadership the past six years as ruling Elders. Mattie Dunlap was also acknowledged with gratitude for her time as Youth Elder this past year. Steve LoGuidice is joining Session as an Elder (class of 2027). Jeff Perkins and Mark Gordon have agreed to another three-year term (Class of 2027). There is still a need for one Elder for a three-year term (Class of 2027). When this Elder position has been filled, a brief congregational meeting will be held to approve the slate of officers.

Here are excerpts from The Book of Order (PC-USA) 2019-21 edition regarding these important leadership positions within the Church.

Ruling elders and deacons are men and women elected by the congregation from among its members. The nomination and election of ruling elders and deacons shall express the rich diversity of the congregation's membership and shall guarantee participation and inclusiveness (F-1.0403). Ruling elders and deacons shall be nominated by a committee elected by the congregation, drawn from and representative of its membership. Ruling elders and deacons shall be elected to serve terms of no more than three years on the session or board of deacons, and may be eligible for reelection according to congregational rule. However, no ruling elder or deacon shall be eligible to serve more than six consecutive years, and a ruling elder or deacon who has served six consecutive years shall be ineligible for election to the same board for at least one year. Election shall be to classes as nearly equal in number as possible, with the term of only one class ending each year. The presbytery may, upon written request and by majority vote, grant a congregation a waiver of this limitation on terms. During this meeting, the lives of Dennis Boen and John Collier were honored as they passed away this month. Communion for the month of June was moved from June 2 (Outdoor Service at Oak Hill Park) to June 9 in the sanctuary.

Tom Rumbaugh from RDM gave the monthly financial report for the month ending on April 30, 2024. Session also voted approval for the proposed 2024 budget for the church, following Tom's explanation.

Rev. Rice reported on his recent activities and shared that he will be undergoing surgery on his hand on June 6, 2024. April Gamble expressed thanks to David for having Rev. Dr. Chan Sok Park preach on 5.26.2024. Laura Neill also complimented David for his message during Dennis Boen's memorial service earlier this month. David was able to honor Dennis' plans and also offer his own message of hope.

Amy Baxstrom reported on her continuing work on her Certification as a Christian Educator. She and Sarah Davis will be taking six youth to Montreat in June. Amy also reported that she is meeting with the leadership group for the Eventide service next week and will update Session on any proposals following that meeting. There will be a summer Eventide series, beginning in July.

Reports from each of the ministry teams were received during this meeting. Minutes from each of their monthly meetings are attached to the Session minutes in the notebook in the gathering area.

There is a need for a church member to serve on the Board of People to People Ministries and then report back to the Faith and Practice Ministry team. Please contact Kris Evans if interested in serving on this important outreach of our church.

Discussion during this evening's meeting continued to circle around the topic of church membership: What does it mean to be a "member" of this community of faith? Is it a public commitment between God, the individual and the church? Is it attendance? Is it being active in church outreach programs? Is it attending on line worship services/in person worship? Is it contributing financially to the church? Is it praying for the church and its care of others? What does it mean to each individual? We, as a group of ruling Elders will continue to discuss these questions as it is important to examine how to welcome each person, encourage each individual in their spiritual journey and most of all, care for all.

Members of Session will continue to meet on the 4th Wednesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. Please reach out to any of the Elders listed above with any questions or concerns. Positive feedback is also welcomed as this team is working diligently to listen, discern and communicate successfully. Greetings from the Resource Development Ministry!

As we close the financial books for the month of April 2024, the RDM is cautiously optimistic as a

third of the year is already over!

The 2024 Stewardship campaign has concluded and has surpassed last year. Year to date numbers are higher so far this year compared to this time last year in congregational contributions, loose offerings, and legacy income. The balanced portfolio of stocks and bonds included in our investment holdings are also positive as we proceed through 2024.

One task that the Session has entrusted the RDM is to help protect our Church assets. As we all know, a major asset to FPC is our church structure. A major part of maintaining our church structure is a process called "tuck-pointing". Quite simply, tuck-pointing is an important, intricate process that involves repairing and replacing the mortar in between the large limestone blocks that make up the outside walls of our church structure. This mortar is eroded by the weather over time, making maintenance is critical to keep the limestone in place, and the integrity of the walls secured.

Faith and Structure is in the process of obtaining bids from contractors to complete this process. The RDM is anticipating a capital campaign later this year in order to help fund this extraordinary expense. More information will be forthcoming in the following months as we devise a plan to keep our building properly maintained and safe for future generations.

WORSHIP AT OAK HILL PARK SUNDAY, JUNE 2, 10:15AM



A lightweight wheelchair would be utilized by those needing assistance in and out and around our church building.



CreateCamp Plus (Grades 6+)


CreateCamp Plus Classes feature more in-depth skills and projects that require two class times to complete. You must be

God to Adam: Take care of my creation Who likes pollution? Who wants more pollution?

Unfortunately, each and every one of us creates pollution each and every day. When we drive our cars, we create **air** pollution. Even an electric vehicle may create pollution, if the electricity is being created in a coal or gas generation plant. When we run a clothes washer or dish washer, we create **water** pollution. And when we put out a bag of garbage, we contribute to **ground** pollution.

In Genesis, God tells Adam, and **us** as his descendants, to take care of the earth. Of **HIS** creation. He also tells us that Rule #1 is to love the Lord. Rule #2 is to love your neighbor. The earth is our neighbor! Let's try to show it a little more love. Here are some *easy* things you can do.

- 1. Try to send one less bag of garbage to the curb each week by using less **disposable** stuff. Buy less **stuff** overall.
- 2. Recycle as much as you can. If you have questions, **ask** me!
- 3. Carry a **reusable** coffee and water container with you and **use** it rather than disposable cups.
- 4. Combine errands in order to drive fewer miles and save time.
- 5. Switch out any remaining old-fashioned light bulbs with LEDs. The price has come down a **lot** lately. And turn off the lights when you leave a room. And right now, during bird migration, please consider turning off outside lights, or switch to motion-detector lights.
- 6. Replace your shower head with a low-flow one. They can give a really nice spray that is just as effective as a downpour.
- 7. Try washing your laundry in cold water instead of warm or hot. For most lightly-soiled tems, you won't notice a difference. And try an earth-friendly laundry detergent. Many aren't any more expensive than traditional detergents, clean just as well, and contaminate ground water less.
- 8. Wash your hair with baking soda! I started doing this a few years ago and it works fine.
- 9. When you need to replace an appliance, consider a heat-pump clothes dryer, heat-pump furnace, a heat-pump water heater. There are tax rebates and tax credits available.

Dennis is survived by his wife Elsa, daughter Jean and her husband Jarad, granddaughters Jocelyn and Josie, his mother Jean Boen, one brother, and two sisters. A memorial service was held at FPC on May 14.

The congregation extends its sympathy to the family of former member Nancy Ditmer who died May 1, 2024. Nancy was born in Piqua, Ohio and graduated from Tippecanoe High School. She earned a Bachelor of Music in music education from Capital University and a Master of Arts in music education from the University of Iowa.

Nancy taught music at two public school districts in southwest Ohio before joining the faculty at the College of Wooster in 1984. Over her 35-year tenure at Wooster Nancy taught courses in music education, conducting, and flute performance;

supervised student teachers; and directed the Scot Marching Band, Scot Symphonic Band and Jazz Ensemble. Nancy was the founder and director of the Wooster Music Camp, an instructional experience for middle and high school students.

Nancy was active in professional organizations and served terms as president of both the Ohio Music Education Association and the National Association of Music Educators. She was a passionate advocate at the state and professional levels for the inclusion of music education standards in public schools. Locally she transformed the honors band program through the Tri-County Educational Service Center into a multi-day event.

After retiring in 2019, Nancy continued to be a resource for local school music programs and played in the Ashland Community Band. She directed the bell choir at FPC some years ago and last spring she and pianist Pam Yarnell presented a musical program for the Over 80's Luncheon. Nancy enjoyed photography and genealogy.

Nancy is survived by her sisters Jean and Judy, one niece, and one nephew. A memorial service was held at Zion Lutheran Church on May 18, 2024.
