As we journey more deeply through the liturgical season of Lent, we see ever-growing visible evidence of the Old English roots of that word: "lencten," which means "Spring" or the "lengthening of day in spring." Daffodils and other seasonal flowers are signaling that winter is gradually coming to an end and this liturgical time will soon give way to the blossoming of Easter. Yet, as you will see in these pages, Lent still has much to offer us in the life of our church.

When you turn to the page featuring our special worship during the Lenten Season, highlighted are the ongoing Wednesday evening Lenten Soup Suppers, Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday Communion Service, Good Friday Tenebrae Service, and Easter Sunday. Eventide continues Sunday evenings at 6:30 through Palm Sunday evening.

Friday Fellowship midday meal will occur on March 8 at 11:30 am in Bruch Hall, and God's Trailblazers, a time of enjoying the coming of spring by walking the trails of Wooster Memorial Park, returns on Sunday, March 17, at 1:00 pm. And extend your knowledge of God's good creation by reading the Earth Care Team's article on pathways for decreasing our congregation's carbon footprint.

Our beloved Don Beane's memorial service will take place in our sanctuary on Saturday morning, March 9, at 10:30 followed by a lunch reception in Bruch Hall. That same evening Don's love of choral musical will be celebrated as we host the Wooster Chorus Spring Concert at 7:30 in the sanctuary.

Finally, our sister Westminster Presbyterian Church will be celebrating a 150th Anniversary on May 5. An integral part of their celebration will be taking part in the Mustard Seed Mission Project. Page 15 in this newsletter gives the details of this ambitious and most meaningful effort to reduce and even eliminate medical debt for those in our area who are in financial distress. This highlight for Tower Tidings is written to update the congregation on the work of the Session in February 2024.

Session met on February 28, 2024 to review the activities of the ministry teams, hear the financial update from January and to plan for upcoming events. The Endowment Allowance policy for 2024 was updated and passed unanimously. Session members heard Amy Baxstrom share about her final project to complete her Christian Educator certification. Carol Gates was appointed by Session to be on Amy's team, as required by PC (USA). Pastor Rice and Lisa Rumbaugh will also be part of Amy's support team here at FPC Wooster. The Session meeting for April will be moved to May 1, with two Session meetings scheduled for the month of May. Discussion during the meeting centered around the applying for funds from the ReKindle grant offered by Columbia Theological Seminary. Faith and Nurture ministry team offered suggestions about how those potential funds could be utilized.

Session also approved the statistical report that is submitted to Presbytery annually. This report includes general information about membership changes, ages of members, and basic church financial data. As you may know, Presbytery is one of the levels of the governance of our denomination. The local churches are collectively represented by Muskingum Valley Presbytery, the Synod and on to the General Assembly of PC(USA).

Members of Session will continue to meet on the 4th Wednesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. Please reach out to any of the Elders listed above with any questions or concerns. Positive feedback is also welcomed as this team is working diligently to listen, discern and communicate successfully. Palm Sunday - March 24


All children and youth will be participating in worship.



Our 150th Anniversary Mustard Seed Mission Project

How shall we compare the kin-dom of God? It is like a mustard seed ... the smallest of all the seeds on earth ... when sown, it rises up and becomes the greatest of all vegetables. (Mark 4:30-32, trans. Amy-Jill Levine)



Imagine if we could activate enough mustard-seed-size efforts to transform the quality of life for our neighbors and other hardworking families in our area!

As Westminster Presbyterian Church in Wooster, Ohio, celebrates its 150th anniversary in 2024, we invite your help as we reach outside our sanctuary walls to assist our neighbors in Wayne and adjacent counties. As disciples of Jesus, we believe in the promise of the mustard seed parable. Small actions, especially when caringly cultivated, can produce yields of amazing size. Imagine living in a community where every person profoundly experiences the life-transforming power of God's kin-dom: the strengthening of the fabric of the community as resources shared bless both the giver and the receiver! May this vision inspire your consideration and contribution to help erase the medical debt of those in our county and nearby.

Every day 1 in 2 Americans choose between paying medical bills and covering basic needs. Nearly 50% of U.S. adults delayed or skipped medical care due to the high cost. 50% of U.S. adults would not be able to afford an unexpected \$500 bill. 2/3 of bankruptcies cite medical debt as a leading cause. Please learn more about the RIP Medical Debt initiative below. Eligible medical debt within Wayne County and its surrounding communities can be greatly reduced or eliminated with your caring contribution.

Here is how it works:

When a contribution is made, RIP uses data analytics to pinpoint the debt of those most in need: households that earn less than 4 times the federal poverty level (varies by county and family size) or whose debts are 5% or more of annual income. RIP buys medical debt at a steep discount. RIP buys debt in bundles, millions of dollars at a time at a fraction of the original cost. This means your donation of \$100 can relieve \$10,000 in medical debt.

Your contribution can wipe out medical debt. Recipients have no tax consequences or penalties to consider. Just like that, they are free of medical debt! RIP will prioritize the funds first in Wayne County, then in Ashland, Holmes, Medina, Stark, and Summit Counties in Ohio.

Your generosity is a lifeline to someone facing a myriad of challenges brought on by medical debt. Your contribution helps one's "neighbor" in the true sense of the word "neighbor" as taught by Jesus of Nazareth.

3 Pathways for Decreasing Carbon Footprint for Congregations

In response to a recent General Assembly policy on lowering church building's impact on climate change, the PC(USA) recommends two excellent structured congregational programs from our partners that will help congregations reduce their carbon footprint. Also shared below are ways a congregation could design their own path to lowering their carbon footprint. Presbyterians are called to take the results of our energy consumption seriously, to pray asking for God's forgiveness and guidance, to reduce energy consumption, and to calculate carbon emissions* and offset their negative impact. We know that we need to make outward changes together in community AND we need structural change, global political will, and massive adaptation/mitigation/funding for climate solutions.

Become a Cool Congregation

An offering from our partners at Interfaith Power and Light, the Cool Congregations challenge is a unique stewardship program helps congregations reduce the carbon footprint of their facilities and engages their members in reducing their carbon footprint at home. 
