This highlight for Tower Tidings is written to update the congregation on the work of the Session in February 2025. This meeting took place on February 26, 2025. A busy agenda guided this group of Elders this month and included the approval of several updated policies. Copies of these policies will be included in the Session notebook in the Gathering Area. Also discussed was the need for a Statement of Belonging to be included on the Church's website. April Gamble compiled a statement that was revised and will be added to our website. It is stated below:

#### Statement of Belonging for First Presbyterian Church, Wooster, Ohio

Aware of our country's complex history, we are intentional about welcoming all people into our beloved church community. We will always try our best to treat all persons with equal respect and concern as beloved children of God. We will examine ourselves, our practices and policies, and will seek to always be open to God's transforming Holy Spirit to reform and transform our actions and lives together. We will intentionally, and in Christian love, be accountable to God and to each other in our language, actions and behavior. We will act as peacemakers and seekers of inclusivity: "God calls the church to work for justice in the world...seeking dignity and freedom for all people,. . .bearing witness against systems of violence and oppression; and redressing wrongs against individuals, groups and peoples."

First Presbyterian Church, Wooster will be hosting the stated meeting of Muskingum Valley Presbytery on Saturday, March 15, 2025 with worship and business meeting to begin at 10:00 a.m. This is an important way to welcome our neighbors within our Presbytery and to participate in the decisions made by this governing body. Elders were encouraged to attend this morning event and to help with greeting and welcoming our guests.

Please be reminded that the Annual Meeting of the congregation will be held on Sunday, April 27, following the 10:30 worship service. We will combine that meeting with a potluck meal on that day. Anyone who is submitting a report to be included in the Annual Report, please send it to Donna by March 30 at the latest.

During this February meeting of the Session, the financial status of the church was discussed following the RDM report. Session members discussed partnering with other faith communities including Presbyterian congregations and churches of other denominations to explore opportunities to expand mission and ministry in a way to increase the impact of that care and the participation of current and future members of our church family. Rev. Rice, Tom Rumbaugh, Stu Miller and Lisa Rumbaugh (Clerk) met with Matt Skolnik (Executive Presbyter of MVP) to discuss ways to reach out to other congregations to form connections and perhaps, combine resources and energies. The theme of "Growing Our Mission Together" was created and to that end, a decision was made to

#### **Greetings from the Resource Development Ministry!**

Our 2025 Stewardship Campaign is currently sitting at \$336,732 of pledges, down a bit from the 2024 level of \$341,000. Please know that you can still submit your pledge card to the church office or anyone on the RDM. We continue to work on the 2025 church budget and will be able to finalize it for Session approval shortly.

Last year proved to be a particular challenging year for our finances. Congregational giving was down \$14,000, but our investments had a positive return of over 8.5% and we received a generous legacy from the Don Beane estate. Some "surprise" expenses last year included the ceiling repair in the basement, fire system repair, lower-level HVAC repairs, and replacing a roof top air conditioning unit.


We also continued to fund our local and national mission projects and benefitted from the highest of quality programming and guidance from church staff as we proceed on our spiritual journeys. In order to pay our bills last year, we did have to go over our budgeted allowance from our investment account. We will evaluate last years numbers and make adjustments to minimize the necessary amounts used from our investments for this year.

#### SPRING BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP

You're invited to join a discussion of the book *The Amen Effect: Ancient Wisdom to Heal Our Broken Hearts and Our World* by Sharon Brous on four Thursday evenings from March 20<sup>th</sup> through April 10<sup>th</sup>. We'll meet from 7:00 p.m. - 8:00 p.m. in the church parlor.

Brous, a leading American rabbi, contends that it is through our most basic human instinct – the longing for connection – that we awaken our shared humanity and begin to heal ourselves and our communities. Weaving together ancient Jewish wisdom, contemporary science, and personal experience, she contends that the spiritual work of our time is to find our way to each other in both celebration and sorrow. This practice of knowing and being known and of journeying together is what she calls "the amen effect".

The Amen Effect is available for purchase online in various formats. At our first meeting on March 20, we'll discuss the Introduction and Chapter 1. 

During this season of Lent, we will be using materials from A Sanctified Art. It is a theme that will make us think of the spaces of gray, the spaces inbetween, and the spaces of unknown. Each week we will explore spaces that we normally look over. Through devotionals, cards, and social media we will explore what it looks like to be in those spaces together.



This year, we're letting the Gospel of Luke guide us through Lent in ARISE. Beginning with Jesus setting his face toward Jerusalem (Luke 9:51), this worship series flows through several familiar stories—the Good Samaritan, Mary and Martha, the fruitless fig tree, the Lost Sheep, Zacchaeus, and more. Many of these stories are well-known in both sacred and secular imagination and hold significance in pop culture, church history, politics, and everything in between. Our theme, "Everything In Between," invites us to navigate the polarities in our lives with more faith, intention, and openness to be transformed. You will see that each weekly theme explores two supposed binaries, like "faith & works" or "rest & growth," or "grief & hope." We often consider these ideas to be opposing. However, as we explore these concepts within the scriptures, we find nuance and complexity. We find that these dichotomies are false. We might begin to see a full spectrum instead of black and white. We might find that God is present in between.

And so, this season, we invite you to look beyond black and white binaries and easy answers. We encourage you to notice the dichotomies that define our <u>lives</u>, <u>but</u> also imagine where God might be meeting us beyond the categories we create. This Lent, we're trusting that God shows up in shades of gray, rainbow hues, and everywhere in between.

# Liturgical Arts Ministry adds art to worship

### First Presbyterian group has been making creative banners for 10 years

WOOSTER - Everyone has different talents. Maybe you're good with your hands, or perhaps you're better with your words or with your mind.

For the members of First Presbyterian Church of Wooster's liturgical arts ministry, the myriad of talents the group has are constantly being used to create gorgeous hanging artwork for the church's chapel.

Currently there are 10 members in the group, whose expertise ranges from everything from hand-dying fabrics to knitting and crocheting. The banners the group creates are incredibly diverse, depicting everything from Easter Sunday with a simple, but gorgeous, cut-vinyl banner to the creation story with diverse, depicting everyvarious striking hues of bold color.

And that work process can take anywhere from a couple of weeks to a couple of months, depending on the intensity of the work the imagined banner requires.

So far as the design process, Tugend said the group srays away from incorporating words into its creations as much as possible, trying to tell the specific story or message they wish to convey with images over words.

The group works on its projects in the upper portion of the church in a room with a spacious table, a design wall and a place to hang the creations once they are ready to be put in stor-



The banner hanging over the center girle of the sanctury is symbolic of the risen bord and the focal moint of our Easter Alleluis






## The Lenten Hangings in the Sanctuary

The Liturgical season is Lent. The color is purple symbolizing repentance and preparation. Designed to enter into active waiting in darkness.

In our fast paced, instant, express lane society, we would like to bypass the 40 days of Lent and get on to Easter lilies, butterflies, painted eggs, and the empty cross. However, we need the dark colors of Lent. As we wait in the darkness, much activity can be going on. An embryo becomes a baby, from a dark chrysalis a butterfly emerges, from tomb comes resurrection.

During Lent, we have the opportunity to enter into active waiting in the darkness. As we journey into our inner being, we are able to make space for God, we listen to God's voice and discern God's call in our lives. In the darkness we can be changed and transformed. We enter the darkness humbly and obediently and pray that we may emerge into the light of Easter as more faithful witnesses and servants to the risen Lord. The Liturgical Arts Group created this hanging in 2006.

The congregation extends its sympathy to the family of longtime member Pearl Grosjean who died on January 30, 2025 at the age of 90. Pearl was born in Kilkeel, County Down, Northern Ireland and trained as a nurse in London. She worked as a district nurse in Belfast before moving to the United States in 1958 to work as a surgical nurse in Lakewood, Ohio. She married her late husband Walt and moved to Wooster in 1961.

Pearl was active in many community organizations and served as president of Junior Women's Club, Civic Club, and Chapter DF of the P.E.O. sisterhood. She organized the first Parental Aid to Teachers (PAT) program at Parkview Elementary School which later expanded to the entire Wooster City School system. Pearl and Walt traveled extensively in their later years including frequent visits back to Northern Ireland.

Pearl is survived by her children Julie, Heidi, and Scott and their spouses and five grandchildren. A private memorial service will be held.





The congregation extends its sympathy to the family of longtime FPC member Carl Schmid who died on February 14, 2025. Carl was born in Wooster, graduated from Wooster High School in 1955, and served in the Marine Corps from 1955-1957. He married his wife Dottie in 1966. Carl worked briefly at Rubbermaid and then enjoyed a career in construction at Snyder Brothers and T.R. Snyder Construction.

Carl is survived by his wife Dottie, his daughter Lorrie and her husband Shane Thacker, and his son Scott. A funeral service was held at McIntire, Bradham & Sleek on February 20, 2025.
