#### Dear Friends,

As summer is resisting its yielding into fall, our program year is off and running. Following a wonderful Rally Day, we had a delicious chili-cookoff and successful youth quarter auction and celebrated the centennial birthday of Keith Brown. After a summer pause, ARISE has returned on Sundays at 8:45, offering a meditative time of singing, prayer, and scripture to lead us into our sabbath morning.

The Session of our church spent time this summer brainstorming ideas for increasing church membership and participation. One of the focus areas was our Sunday worship and wondering what we might add or reframe to appeal to the diversity of our congregation. One of the immediate "new practices" is beginning our services with the pouring of the baptismal water into the font. Baptism theologically symbolizes our engrafting into the Body of Christ, so the liturgical act of pouring water to begin our worship reminds us of our own baptisms into the faith. Other ideas being considered are enabling those who cannot come to the pulpit to lead us in the liturgy to do so from their seat in the pews And developing a collection of prayers that various members of the congregation can offer during the time of Prayers of the People. Stay tuned for other worship enhancements!

Another area of discussion for the Session is an emphasis on financial giving in order to strengthen our fiscal future. We are now entering our annual Stewardship Season when we consider our financial pledges to the budget for Year 2026. In addition to our yearly pledges, we are also having informal presentations on estate and planned giving. Please take note of when and where these meetings are taking place and plan to attend.

Alongside these newer developments, this month's newsletter gives us information about our annual Fall Festival on Sunday, October 5, and the Women's Fellowship Rummage Sale, which will occur on November 1<sup>st</sup>. Needless to say, many of us will be digging into our attics and basements to see what we can unload!

As the colors of the season begin to change in earnest and the leaves begin to fall, may the beauty of God's creation inspire us to enjoy the fellowship, study, and worship that graces our life together in First Presbyterian Church.

This highlight for Tower Tidings is written to update the congregation on the work of the Session of First Presbyterian Church. This summary will include information from the regular meeting of Session on September 24, 2025.

As Clerk of Session, Lisa Rumbaugh reported on new members (welcome David and Paige Jones and Mary Sayler) and gave an update from Muskingum Valley Presbytery. Session commissioned Tom Rumbaugh to be the elder representing FPC Wooster at future stated meetings of MVP in December 2025 and the four meetings in 2026. As a commissioned elder from FPC, Tom will vote at those meetings. Lisa Rumbaugh will be attending these meetings as Moderator Elect (2025) and Moderator (2026).

Session heard a report from the small group organized to create a cohesive plan and policies surrounding rental of the lower level of our church building. This group has met, has consulted legal and tax specialists and is working to make a list of factors to discuss with potential renters. Session will have the final approval of all rental agreements. Renovation of this level of the building continues with painting and flooring upgrades. Please offer to help with this project, if your energy and talents allow. If not, please continue to keep development of this resource project in your prayers.

Each of the Coordinating Teams offered updates from their most recent meetings. The need for coordination between teams was expressed, so the chairs of each of the teams will plan a time to discuss ministries and communication. We are thankful for the wonderful leadership and dedication of these leaders and the many people who support the ministries of our church.

As promised, Session continues to look ahead to what our church requires now and in the future. They are currently receiving guidance from the PCUSA/Muskingum Valley Presbytery through a series of meetings where they are discussing our needs as the cultural and church landscape continues to shift.

Members of Session will continue to meet on the 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. Please reach out to any of the Elders listed above with any questions or concerns. Positive feedback is also welcomed as this team is working diligently to listen, discern, and communicate successfully. #### **Greetings from the Resource Development Ministry (RDM)**

The FPC year-to-date finance numbers through August 2025 include revenue of \$357,879 and expenses of \$397,433 for a deficit of just under \$40k. Please be assured that the RDM and Session are closely monitoring this deficit and formulating financial plans to correct this going forward.



## THANK YOU GABE!!







It may be cliché, but one of the quickest and easiest ways to reduce your environmental impact is by swapping out your old incandescent bulbs for LEDs. Traditional incandescent bulbs use 60 watts of energy per hour. If left on 6 hours a day that's \$26 per year and 120 pounds of carbon pollution—just for a single light bulb! Swapping that incandescent for an LED reduces it to just \$4 a year and 18 pounds of pollution. Multiply that times all the bulbs in your house and that's a lot of savings! Especially considering that LED bulbs cost roughly the same as incandescent bulbs and last 10x longer. And don't bother with the twisty CFL bulbs. They use 50% more energy than LEDs and contain toxic mercury.

God tells us to be stewards of earth. In Genesis 2:15, one of God's first statements to Adam in the garden is to tend and keep the garden. The Hebrew words here, 'abad' and 'shamar' can also be translated to 'serve' and 'protect.' It may seem silly to suggest that changing your light bulbs helps serve and protect God's creation, but that's exactly what it does. Not only does cutting electricity save you money, but it also reduces how much coal or methane gas are burned to create that electricity. That means cleaner air, cleaner water, fewer mountaintops being removed for coal mining, and an overall healthier environment in Ohio.

Some people are concerned about the color of LED bulbs, but they come in many different tones. If you like the warmer light of traditional bulbs buy the "warm white" LED bulbs. (Hint: Look for bulbs listed below 3000k temperature, and preferably around 2,700k for a truly warm color). Unsure where to get started? #### WHY REDUCE PLASTICS?

- Plastic pollution damages ecosystems and harms well-being.
- Microplastics end up in our water and food sources leading to health issues and cancer.
- Serious injustice of which communities are most harmed by our plastic use.





#### WHAT CAN I DO?

- Try a plastic-free Lenten season or other season
- Reduce single-use plastics by using reusable bags, water bottles, utensils, and straws
- Eat less shellfish they contain the most microplastics
- Educate yourself on your personal plastic use:
  - How much plastic do you use on a weekly basis?
  - What happens to your plastic waste after you discard it?
- Advocate! Reach out to local, state, and national representatives to support environmental policies

#### WHAT CAN MY CHURCH DO?

- Reduce the amount of plastics used for community meals (switch to reusable paper or bamboo instead)
- Do a community cleanup around your church/neighborhood
- Donate to support communities impacted by pollution
- Advocate for your denomination to divest from fossil fuels
