This highlight for Tower Tidings is written to update the congregation on the work of the Session of First Presbyterian Church. This summary will include information from a June Work Session and the August 27th meeting of Session.

Rev. Rice was not available to moderate the June meeting of Session, so a work session to discuss Growth and Outreach with Steve LoGuidice as facilitator was held. Steve reported on the four goals set by RDM:

Create a cohesive plan for rental space within the church building.

- * Create and use a systematic plan for pursuit of grants
- * New approach to stewardship
- * Develop a Legacy gift program

Steve created a deck of information that was the result of the brainstorming session in May 2025. Four "themes" emerged from that discussion:

- * Worship/Music
- * Marketing/External Outreach
- * Fun/Small Groups
- * Develop an intentional program around welcoming visitors and incorporating them into the life of the church

The Worship/Music topic was the first one discussed and it centered around how to incorporate different elements into the worship experience that may increase interaction and expand our welcome. A small group was charged with researching different worship styles and reporting back to Session in August. This was done at the August meeting and ideas will be shared with the Faith and Worship Coordinating Team at their next meeting. For example, some of the ideas looked at how to easily involve more people in worship (liturgy, prayers of the people, etc.).

Session Highlights

Marketing/External Outreach was the next topic discussed and those conversations linked the Small Groups and Welcoming/Hospitality topics also. Paula Abrecht took ideas for increased hospitality back to the Faith and Nurture team and shared plans for a Welcoming Table in the Gathering Area.

Lisa has been in touch with the Clerk of Session at Westminster Presbyterian Church regarding FPC's invitation to discuss how our two congregations can potentially combine efforts and resources in joint ministry to our shared community. The Session at Westminster Presbyterian Church was meeting on the same evening as FPC's Session. Communication regarding their discussion is expected in the near future.

It is important to remember the organization of our church community. Ideas for activities, fellowship, worship, ministries, etc. are welcomed, valued and may be offered by anyone in the church family. Small groups around those ideas can be formed and become "ministry teams" under the care of a Coordinating Team (Faith and Nurture, Faith and Practice, Faith and Structure, Faith and Worship). Those Coordinating Teams share their work and needs with Session each month so ruling elders are aware of the many ministries of FPC. We are thankful for this organizational framework and strive to keep it intact through strong, consistent communication and caring discernment.

Please reach out to any Session member (listed above) or a chair of a Coordinating Team if you have an idea or a need to share. Chairs of Coordinating teams are: Paula Abrecht (F&N), Kris Evans (F&P), Nancy Young and Susie Slack (co-chairs F&W) and David Rice or Tim Hall (F&S).

Members of Session will continue to meet on the 4th Wednesday of each month at 7:00 p.m. Please reach out to any of the Elders listed above with any questions or concerns. Positive feedback is also welcomed as this team is working diligently to listen, discern and communicate successfully. 
SAVE THE DATE! SEPTEMBER 7TH FOR AN ENGAGING START TO OUR PROGRAM YEAR!

FALL BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP

You're invited to join a discussion of the book *How We Learn to Be Brave: Decisive Moments in Life and Faith* by Mariann Edgar Budde on four Thursday evenings from September 25 through October 16. We'll meet from 7:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. in the church parlor.

Budde, the bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Washington D.C., explores how key decisions in our lives, if navigated with faith and discernment, pave the way for us to become our most courageous selves. She weaves stories from her own life, religious texts, the Civil Rights movement, literature, pop culture, and current events to illustrate what goes into "being brave." Part memoir, part history, and part theological treatise, the book focuses on the virtue of courage as a choice that we make.

NEW BEGINNINGS




See, I am doing a new thing!

For the month of September we are focusing on "How to Recycle Properly" and want to review some important reminders with everyone. When you think of the "3 R's (Reduce, Reuse, Recycle), recycling should always be the last option. **Please try to REDUCE your waste and REUSE things as much as possible!** The Stark-Tuscarawas-Wayne Recycling District mails a Recycling Guide out to everyone in the county each year. It contains a lot of helpful information. If you missed it, there is very helpful information available at **timetorecycle.org** in the "How to Recycle" section and then click "Residents." Below you will find helpful information summarized from their guide and website.



Proper Plastic Recycling



Many people are most often confused about how to recycle plastic properly. One common mistake is people think plastic bags can be recycled in your curbside containers or drop off bins. **PLEASE DO NOT PUT PLASTIC BAGS IN THESE CONTAINERS!** Plastic bags can only be recycled at specific sites. Our church has a white bin in the gathering area to collect these for a Rotary project. Buehler's and Kohl's also collect plastic bags for recycling. If you put your recyclables in a plastic bag, you can dump the contents out into the recycling bin and leave the bag in the container as a liner to reuse.

Unfortunately, our recycling district can only collect plastic bottles and jugs with a neck and shoulders. Please rinse and air dry thoroughly! They **DO NO**T collect containers for things like yogurt, cottage cheese, sour cream, take-out, and clamshell containers for foods like lettuce and berries. This is unfortunate and confusing because they used to collect these kinds of plastics. **If you are ever in doubt, it is better to throw it out because it contaminates the recycling stream!**



Please break down cardboard and remove any packaging. You need to throw styrofoam and other materials that can't be recycled away. Then flatten it before putting it in the bin. Flattened cardboard takes up less space and helps facilities run more efficiently, so please take this extra step! Paper, junk mail, newspapers, magazines, and paper shopping bags are all accepted.

Glass Bottles and Jars



All colors of glass bottles and jars are recyclable. Labels don't need to be removed. Please rinse and air dry before recycling.

Metal Cans

Steel and aluminum cans are accepted. Labels don't need to be removed. Please rinse and air dry before recycling. **Aluminum foil is NOT recyclable. It should be reused or thrown away.

Hello to all our Earth Care Team Members

Work on the new pollinator garden on the south side of the church, where there had previously been a vegetable garden, is progressing well. We have met several times with Denise Ellsworth from CFAES to discuss our project. She met with us earlier this summer to look over the plot on the south side of the church and give us advice on how to proceed. The first step was to "smother" the healthy crop of weeds which had set up residence in the approximately 10' x 70' plot. The entire plot was first covered with cardboard. Cardboard was procured from Lowe's and Wooster Appliance Center (a BIG thank you to both of those local businesses!!). A thick layer of wood chips was placed on top of the cardboard and we waited for rain and heat to begin the process of curtailing weed growth. We surely got lots of HEAT. And plentiful rainfall in June and July. Now we are planning the first planting step. We will begin this in late September or the first week of October.

Here's where you can help. The plants which have been chosen for this project are listed below. We are primarily using native Ohio plants for this pollinator garden. If you have any of these plants in your garden and would be able to share/donate some of them to our project, we would greatly appreciate it.


